# REPORT OF THE GORHAM TOWN COUNCIL REGULAR MEETING April 3, 2018

Chairman Hartwell opened the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag. There were 8 members of the public in attendance at the start of the meeting.

Roll Call: Chairman Hartwell, Councilors Benner, Shepard, Stelk, Hager, Smith and Phillips. Also in attendance were Town Manager Ephrem Paraschak and Town Clerk Laurie Nordfors.

Moved by Councilor Stelk, seconded by Councilor Shepard and VOTED to accept the minutes of the March 6, 2018 Council Meeting. **7 yeas** 

### **Councilor Communications**

Councilor Phillips congratulated the Gorham Business Exchange on a successful Market Place this year at USM. She noted that there were a lot of new booths and she thanked all that attended. She also noted that if Businesses did not get a chance to attend the meeting last week on Personal Property Tax, do not hesitate to contact the Town Assessing Department for more information on Personal Property Tax.

Councilor Benner announced that as Gorham's Representative for Eco-Maine, she is excited to report that they are beginning to sort out food waste from the rest of the trash. If anyone has any questions on what is recycle and what is trash, you can go to <a href="https://www.ecomaine.org/recyclopedia">www.ecomaine.org/recyclopedia</a> and enter the name of a waste item and it will tell you how to recycle or dispose of the item. There is also an APP on your Smartphone. She also reported that the METRO Bus Service in Gorham should be rolling out busses by the end of August.

Councilor Stelk reported that as the Town Council Representative to the Greater Portland Council of Government Executive Committee she has been working with their Senior Land Use Planner discussing the need for some kind of software program to help us understand the impact of our current codes and ordinances and what software we should have for a better strategic approach to the growth of Gorham.

Councilor Hager reported that the Finance committee met to review the budget to date and noted that the Town is slightly ahead on revenue and slightly under on expenses. They plan to meet again soon.

# **Town Managers Report**

Town Manager Ephrem Paraschak noted that with winter behind us and as we transition into spring, Public Works will be out cleaning up sand and the Rec Department will be out getting fields ready for play. If you see a posted sign on one of the fields, please stay off it to give the field time to dry out. The MDOT will be accepting bids on the Main Street road project and will then proceed with the project. He also noted that the Town Budget was delivered to Council and is looking forward to the upcoming Budget workshops on April 6<sup>th</sup> and April 24<sup>th</sup>.

## School Committee Report

Chairman Wright noted that Kindergarten open house was held across the three elementary schools and as of right now, there are 214 students signed up for kindergarten for next year with a projected 245 students by the fall. He congratulated Ryan Chicoine and the JMG students, who competed against 700 other high school students from across the State in the categories of public speaking, job interview skills and college admissions, among other events. The students came home with three trophies. On April 2<sup>nd</sup>, the School Committee completed its 5<sup>th</sup> full budget workshop meeting with the District Leadership team and completed the budget development process. The School Committee will be voting on the proposed budget at the next regular meeting on April 11<sup>th</sup>. The joint meeting with the Town Council is scheduled for May 15<sup>th</sup>. The GHS building committee and athletic capital campaign committee held their latest meeting on March 27<sup>th</sup> where they reviewed information collected by Harriman through their stakeholder interviews. They looked at a draft of the programming needs at the High School based on these interviews. They also were updated on the latest conversations with Shawn Moody regarding a parcel of land near the high school, where the process stands with the National Park Service and the next steps. A survey will be sent out in the future to collect information from staff, students, parents and community members through Thought Exchange. At the next meeting on April 10<sup>th</sup>, the Committees will be reviewing the program document in preparation for it being presented to the School Committee at the April 25<sup>th</sup> workshop. The Committee is also visiting three area High Schools as part of the process. The School Committee has asked the Superintendent to provide an overview of their policies and procedures in regard to dealing with issues of bullying in our schools. This information will be provided on camera at the April 11<sup>th</sup> meeting for those interested.

Chairman Hartwell opened public hearing #1. There were no comments from the public and the hearing was closed.
